TOWN AND COUNTRY IN EIGHTEENTH-CENTURY BRITAIN (Mme Bernez)

The course will examine the social, economic and cultural changes occurring in the period 1688 to the early 1800s. Students will be expected to know roughly the chronology of major political events during that time, from what they learnt in history classes in the second year and other sources, including encyclopedias and broad-ranging histories of Britain.
